About the Student Symposium from a Professor Viewpoint

The Civil Engineering program at Tarleton State University began in Fall 2014, and I joined in 2015. As a young engineer, graduating with a PhD from the University of Alabama in Huntsville, where ASCE team won five national championships in concrete canoe, I was inspired to bring that passion to Tarleton. So, we have set one of our goals as to establish an ASCE student chapter and encourage students to build their first concrete canoe.

In 2018, we started the ASCE student chapter at Tarleton, and by 2020, our students competed in their first ASCE symposium, winning several awards. The highlight was winning first place in the Concrete Frisbee competition, second place in Surveying competition, third place in Concrete Bowling competition, and the Keith McBride Spirit of the Competition Award with our first concrete canoe. For me, concrete canoe was more than a competition; it was a symbol of unity, grit, and hands-on learning.

Engaging and helping students in ASCE activities has been a rewarding experience. These competitions go beyond classroom learning, teaching students problem-solving, teamwork, and resilience. We faced challenges, especially in securing financial sponsors, but our students overcame them with determination.






Who Will Attend?
